

The Victoria L. Coffing Scholarship Fund

Victoria 'Vicky' Coffing was born on December 28, 1954 in Frankfort, Germany. She was the daughter of Robert H. and Patricia Joan (Snyder) Cain. Victoria married George E. Coffing on May 18, 1974 in Twelve Mile, Indiana.

She took pride in being a farmer's wife, spending quality time with her five children, eleven grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren, and being an active member in the Fulton United Methodist Church. Victoria also worked as a private home healthcare provider.

Victoria passed away on March 7, 2015 in Rochester, Indiana, but her legacy lives on.

According to Victoria's daughter, Jessica Fort, Victoria's mission was to be a faithful servant of the Lord and to serve Him by serving others. She stated that no matter what her mother was doing in her life, she was always there for other people.

Jessica wrote in a statement, "I know that Momma would be honored to see how much her life has helped shape that of so many others. With this scholarship, her legacy will live on and help prepare you to do great things for Christ."

The Victoria L. Coffing Scholarship Fund was established in 2015 by the Fulton County Methodist Church. The purpose of this fund is to provide financial support for students attending an institution of higher learning.

To be considered for the Victoria L. Coffing Scholarship Fund, applicants must be a graduate of Caston High School in Fulton, Indiana. The student must be seeking a two or four-year degree and must be accepted into and attending an accredited college or university. Non-traditional students are eligible to apply. Preference should be given to students studying in one of the following fields (listed in order of preference): Christian Ministry, Education, or any Medical Field.

Students must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale during their high school career and must show extracurricular activities and be active in school or volunteer work. Some preference will be given to students who are active in church and have participated in mission trips and who are members of the Fulton United Methodist Church in Fulton, Indiana. The scholarship is available to graduate students, but preference should be given to undergraduate applicants.
